Solutions for PFAS Recovery: Strengthen Public Trust, Restore Environmental and Financial Resources

As several states move to limit the land application of biosolids due to PFAS concerns, many utilities are exploring emerging technologies to comply with new regulations while working with limited budgets. Utilities should not be financially responsible for PFAS contamination they did not cause. To avoid passing costs along to ratepayers, many wastewater systems are pursuing cost recovery litigation against PFAS manufacturers as an innovative funding strategy.

In this session, Ken Sansone, Senior Partner at SL Environmental Law Group P.C., will share:

- Update on current and proposed legislation regulating PFAS and biosolids, and how they may affect systems in Minnesota, Illinois, and Wisconsin.
- What other systems are doing to successfully address PFAS water contamination and shift the cleanup costs to the manufacturers responsible for the pollution.
